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#### PROVISIONAL LIST OF THE CHAMFERED RECTANGULAR CANCELLATIONS OF THE BELGIAN RAILWAY PARCEL POST

Compiled by Norman Claydon and Peter Rollinson

#### Introduction

The use of these cancellations have been recorded from early 1908 until 1988, although they were overlapped in the early and late stages by other cancellations.

It is now some 10 years since the detailed recording of the above cancellations and their entry on to a Card Index commenced. It is even longer ago that members of the Circle started to produce simple lists which have also been entered, as required, on to the Card Index.

The details given on the cards has had to be summarised considerably in order to compile this list, which shows all those Stations indicated in the 1929-30 Timetables, together with further Stations, Depots and Offices, etc. from earlier and later sources.

Thus some 1,750 Stations, etc. are shown, not all of which, however, would have used these cancellations. For example, 202 are indicated in the 1929-30 Timetables as being Halts but only 4 have been recorded as ever using these cancellations, probably on being upgraded to a Station. Again, some 240 Stations, etc. do not appear in the above Timetables and the scarcity of cancellations from this group suggests that a large number did not have the facilities requiring the use of such cancellations.

It would be much appreciated if members could find a little time to examine their collections to see if they can amend or add to the List in any way. Any information should be sent to Norman Claydon or Peter Rollinson.

Finally, we would like to acknowledge the help given by members of the Circle and especially to Tony Geake, Ed Hirdler, Barry Horne and to those members who have since passed on - Alan Dell, Spike Hughes, Jack McGilloway and Ernie Taylor. Thanks should also be recorded to Peter Smerdon, a non-member, who was instrumental in obtaining Timetables and other information.





In the lower pane, the "A du T" cachet is below the 49th and 50th stamps and the perforation cross below the 48th stamp.




In all the photos of pieces with markings that I have seen the lefthand border is imperforate.

However, in Balasse Sale 1287/9 4th-7th May, 1985, lot 385 consisted of a block of 45 of the 2fr (9 rows of 5) in which both side borders were perforated. This, or a similar block, was shown by M. Marquet at Belgica 72. Also in Balasse Sale 1121/4 of 11th-15th December, 1976, lot 150 was a block of 8 of the 2fr in which the lefthand border was perforated.

#### "RETURN TO SENDER" - AS THE "STREET IS UNKNOWN" 1928

The 30c rate for internal postcards was increased on 15th December, 1927, to 35c. During this period of inflation, stocks of the 30c cards were printed with an additional 5c stamp.





THE LARGE BEARDS ISSUE OF 1905

At Flemallex I was pleased that the Belgian Postal Museum exhibit was mainly of the 1905 Issue as this is an Issue I know little about.

The items on display included complete panes of fifty stamps, which were:

20c Olive green Panes IV and V with the Atelier du Timbre cachet under 48th stamp Pane IV.

25c Blue Panes V and VI with the Atelier du Timbre cachet under 48th stamp Pane VI Sheet No. 995961. Depot 1910.

35c Brown-purple Panes I and II.

50c Grey. Half sheet of 150 Panes I, II and III.

1 Franc. Lower Pane of 50 Atelier du Timbre cachet under 49th and 50th stamps. Perforation cross below 48th stamp Sheet No. 017577


In the Philateliste Belge of 1939 there is an article on this Issue by Paul de Smeth in which he says that the three high values, 50c, 1fr and 2fr were issued on 21st July, 1905, the day of the Fête Nationale, in panes of fifty. In these panes, the marginal markings denoting the value of the stamp and the number of the sheet appeared in the horizontal margins and not the vertical ones as in illustrations.

I'm of the opinion that for this printing narrow sheets of paper were used sufficient to print two panes at at time, one above the other. The photos in auction catalogues, that I have seen, all indicate that the panes occupied positions I and IV in the large sheet of 300. The 50c reverted to sheets of 300 after the first printing as is evidenced by the half sheet of 150. Depot Marks for 1907, 1908 and 1911 are known.

The sheets of 100 were numbered either above the upper pane or below the lower pane when the number would be upside down.

In the upper pane, the "A du T" cachet is above stamps 1 and 2, but upside down, and the perforation cross above stamp 3.





#### BOOK REVIEW

"La Poste Rurale au XIXeme Siècle en Belgique, et en Europe" by Jean-Claude Porignon. January, 1993. 2,630 Belgian Francs. 370 pages (51 pages in colour and include 269 pages catalogue).

In the period about 1950, postal historians finding letters with small circles containing a letter were content to attempt to collect a complete set from A to Z, not at that time knowing much about them. Since then, a number of collectors have become interested in them and now, after many years, M. Porignon has produced this superb work.

The Belgian Rural Postal service was based on the French system introduced in 1830. In Belgium its application started in 1836 (September) and these marks were progressively introduced until about 1896, when the administration did not require its postmen to apply that mark on every piece of mail collected from the rural post box.

The taxation marks specific to the rural post service (SR, CA, CC), all of which are explained, and which could be in black, red, blue and green ink.

The catalogue details of some 2,500 post boxes in the rural areas and which some 68% of the communes have had their letter identified. There are also details of the rural posts of some 9 other European countries: France, Germany, Spain, Great Britain, Greece, Italy, Luxembourg, Netherlands, Switzerland.

All those who are interested in this subject should obtain a copy of this book for their library.

We look forward to hearing more of this Society and its Journal.



Postal card from Malmedy to Hamburg. Dated 24 February, 1947. Single circle Malmedy cancellation.

Postal card No. 138 per catalogue of the Belgian Postal Stationery Society.

Violet, single circle. British censorship mark applied in the British Zone of Germany.



Period B-5 (Third Reich period).

Cover from Malmedy to Brussels. Dated 27 June, 1942. Large German single circle cancellation with the inscription "Heimkehr ins Grossdeutsche Vaterland" which translates as "Return to the Greater German Fatherland".

Contents checked by a censor. Wehrmacht Censor-office No. "18" in a small box. German censor tape on the lefthand edge of the cover.


Postage for abroad (Germany to Belgium) 25 pfennig.

Franking: one 25 pfennig Hindenburg, medallion, blue (Michel No. 522).

Period B-4 (Early first Belgian period).

Postal card from Malmedy to Zürich with single circle Belgian cancellation. Dated 7 December, 1920.

Franking: 10 centimes with overprint "Malmedy". (Malmedy postal card No. 3 per the Belgian Postal Stationery Society catalogue.)



Period B-4 (first Belgian period).

Cover from Malmedy to Brussels. Dated 7 August, 1930. Postage 60 centimes.

Franking: two 10 centimes stamps (No. 280 of Belgian Stamp Dealers' Association Catalogue). Two postal stationery cut-outs of 5 and 35 centimes.



Period B-4 (Early first Belgian period).

from Malmedy to Rheinbach, near Bonn. Cover Dated 6 February Postage, 30 centimes (or 30 pfennige). 1920.

Franking: six 5 centime green stamps of the 1915 issue of Belgium overprinted "EUPEN/&/MALMEDY/5PF". These stamps were in use during the period 15th January, 1920 to 5th March, 1920.

Note: At the very beginning of the above period i.e. in January 1920, there was an insufficient supply of the overprinted "Eupen & Malmedy - Pfg Belgian stamps. Thus mixed frankings of overprinted stamps (centime/pfennig) and German normal Belgian stamps (pfennig) were authorised during a short period of time.



Period B-3 (German Empire period).

Cover from Malmedy to Bordeaux. Dated 27 April, 1873. Malmedy double circle postmark.

PD in red is the Aachen mark for paid to destination. The small single circle is the French border mark.

Postage, 3 groschen. From 15th May, 1872 the rate was 3 groschen except for destinations close to the border, for which the required postage was  $2\frac{1}{2}$  groschen.

Franking: one 1 groschen, red, large shield of the 4th issue (Michel No. 19). One 2 groschen, blue, large shield of the 4th issue (Michel No. 20).


Period B-3 (German Empire period).

Postal card from Malmedy to Brussels cancelled with a single circle postmark. Dated 6 June, 1888. Ribbon style merchant's cachet "DUBOIS-VILLERS MALMEDY". Franking: 10 pfennig red (Michel No. 41 - issue of 1880).


Cover from Malmedy to Leipzig. Dated 21 September, 1862. Black double circle Malmedy postmark.

Postage, 3 groschen. Internal Prussian mail. Distance greater than 20 miles.

Franking, 3 each one groschen stamps of the 7th issue (Michel No.16).



Period B-2 (North German Confederation period). Cover from Malmedy to Munich. Dated 4 June, 1870. Postage, 1 groschen. Franking, one each 1 groschen, red, 4th issue (Michel No. 16).

Cover from Malmedy to Paris. Dated 18 February 1864. Double circle Malmedy postmark.


From 1st June, 1858 the single rate postage for mail to France was  $3\frac{1}{2}$  groschen.

Elliptical merchant's cachet "FR. JOS. BOESBERG - MALMEDY.

Mixed franking, groschen and pfennig: one 3 silver groschen stamp (Michel No. 18) and two 4 pfennig stamps (Michel No. 14). One groschen equalled 12 pfennig. Thus the franking equals 3 2/3 silver groschen i.e. one-sixth of a groschen overpaid.

PD in red struck on the cover at the Prussian border post office of Aachen confirming that postage has been paid to destination.

Black double circle transit mark struck at the French border, "PRUSSE A ERQUELINNES".

Cover from Malmedy to Luxembourg. Dated 11 August, 1857. Black double circle Malmedy postmark. The stamps have been struck with the 4 ring "911" Malmedy killer.

Elliptical merchant's cachet "J. VAN DER MAESENIN - MALMEDY".

The franking of this item is 2 groschen in the form of two 1 silver groschen, rose, stamps of the third issue (Michel No. 6). This is the normal single rate for mail departing from Malmedy to the Duchy of Luxembourg.

In the lower left corner, the sender has also written "fco" (franco), which means postage paid.

At the first onset, the printed "franco" was applied (by error) at the dispatching, Malmedy, post office. However, the weight of the item was 1.1 Lot (about 18.3 grams or 2/3 oz.) and therefore required a double postage rate. When this was found out, the item was considered as non-franked. Thus the charge to be claimed to the addressee amounted to 4 silver groschen i.e. twice the single The handwritten blue mark "4" in the middle left of the rate. cover indicates the amount due, to be paid in cash at the cover arrival. (Prussia and Luxembourg used the same currency at that time.) Just to the right of the stamps is also written in blue "reicht nicht", which is German for insufficiently paid. The postman or clerk of the Malmedy post office forgot to cross out the printed franco, which was often done with a blue pencil.

On the reverse:

Black double circle mark Weiswampach 11 Août (August) 1857 as a transit postmark of the Luxemburg border exchange post office.

Black double circle arrival mark of Luxemburg (city) dated 12 Août 1857.

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
Cover from Malmedy to Franfort on the main. Dated 24 January ?. Black double circle Malmedy postmark.

The stamps are "killed" with a "911" in the centre of four concentric circles (Vierringstempel). The "911" was the postal code for Malmedy. The first Prussian stamps were issued on 15 November, 1850. The four ring cancellations are mainly found on the four stamps of the first Prussian issue (Michel No.1 thru 4).

The handwritten weight is indicated to the right of the double circle Malmedy mark.

Elliptical merchant's cachet "NICOLAS MOSTERT MALMEDY".

Postage 6 groschen. Postage of 3 groschen was required for mail between towns more than 20 miles apart (1 geographic mile equalled 7,420.4 metres. Later it was extend to 7.5 km). Thus, this item is franked at a double rate. Franking - two 3 groschen stamps, yellow on black (Michel No. 4).



Period B-1 (Prussian period).

Cover from Malmedy to Clervaux. Dated 10 September, 1853. Black boxed Malmedy postmark, with day (10), month (9) and hour (7-8) as interval. On the reverse:

Black, boxed St. Vith mark. This is the mark of the Prussian border exchange office.

Double circle Weiswampach black marking. Transit border marking of the Duchy of Luxembourg. (Weiswampach was a little frontier town on the route Malmedy - St. Vith - Luxembourg).

Arrival double circle black mark of Clervaux, Luxembourg.

Postage, handwritten 25 centimes due. The postage rate of 25 centimes or 2 groschen (1 gr. was 12.5 cent. worth) corresponds to the 2nd rayon of Prussia (distances between 10 and 20 miles). The handwritten "2" could mean just that.

It could be translated in French as follows:

A sa noblesse, Monsieur de Monschau, Juge de Paix Royal, à St. Vith.

And, in English:

To His Honour Mr. Von Monschau Royal Judge of the Peace, St. Vith



Period A-4 (Prussian period).

Cover from Malmedy to Coeln (Cologne). Dated 11 November, 1830. Black Malmedy postmark. The name Malmedy, and on a second line, the day and month in numerals, are enclosed in a frame. This shape frame is called a "Nierenstempel" (kidney cancellation) by German postal history collectors (Herlant type bp). It appeared after the marking in (7) above, starting in about 1825 but the two were used indiscriminately.

Handwritten in the lower left corner is "Cultus S." which, in current German usage, means Kultussache (church matter). Also the inscription "Cultus S." was a free of port marking.

Roman hand, in German:

"Seiner Hochwurden dem Dechanten des Metropoliten Dom-Kapitels und und Erzbischöflichen Generalvikar, Herrn Schüsgens, Hochwohlgeboren, zu Cöln


In French:

"A son Eminence le Doyen du chapitre métropolite de la Cathédrale et Vicaire Général Archiépiscopal, Monsieur Schüsgens, Noble, à Cologne"

In English:

To His Eminence the Dean of the Metropolitan Chapter of the Cathedral and Archiepiscopal Vicar General, Mister Schüsgens, Cologne.



Period A-3 (Second Tour & Taxis period).

Cover from Malmedy to Anthee, near Dinant. Dated 1 May, 1816. Red Malmedy postmark (Herlant type 2 fig.c) used during the period December, 1815 through to the end of 1816. This mark is also found in black without any postal significance. It is assumed that, at certain times, black ink was all that was handy for the postman or clerk.

Postage, 5 decimes due.



Period A-4 (Prussian period).

Cover from Malmedy to St. Vith. Dated 26 March, 1830. Black Malmedy two line postmark. Under 'Malmedy' is the date and month, 26 Mart (March) (Herlant type ap).

In the lower left corner, there is written "G-Just.S." which means "Geheimjustiz Sache". This is German, meaning confidential justice item. At that time, the inscription "G-Just.S." was a free of port marking.

The address is in the old German Gothic style of writing. Turned into Roman hand, the address becomes:

"Seiner Hochgeboren dem Herrn von Monschau königlicher Friedenrichter in St. Vith".



Period A-2 (French period).

Cover from Malmedy to Beaune. Dated 27 June, 1801. Black Malmedy single line postmark plus a two line "96 Verviers" postmark (Herlant type 2 fig.a and type 5). 96 is the administrative number for the "Department of the Ourthe".

Both Malmedy and Verviers were in Department 96. At this time, the small town of Malmedy had a post office only for receiving mail. Outgoing mail was taken to the main district post office in Verviers for processing.

Postage, handwritten, 7 decimes due.



Period A-3 (Second Tour & Taxis period).

Cover from Malmedy to Francomont, near Verviers. Dated 1 Dec 1815.

Black two line P96P SPA postmark (Herlant type 6). The "P.P." means that postage to destination has been paid. After a postal reorganisation in 1802, Malmedy came under the postal administration at Spa.

The sender's handwritten "Franco" on the cover also means that postage was paid to destination. On the reverse is a handwritten 2 decimes - postage paid.




Period A-1 (First Tour & Taxis period).

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Cover from Malmedy to Gent. Dated 5 May, 1784. Malmedy black postmark struck in the upper right corner. This is the earliest recorded type of a Malmedy cancellation (Herlant Type 2 - fig.a). Postage, handwritten, 5 sols due.

Before 1800 the postage in Gent was expressed in "sol". After 1800, the "decime" was used (1 decime equalled 1 sol).



Period A-2 (French period).

On the reverse, in black, official administrative cachet mark 'EXECUTION DES LOIS' (in application of the law).

Postage, handwritten, 4 decimes due.

#### A Selection of Covers from Malmedy

Following is a selection of Malmedy covers illustrating the different periods mentioned above along with a few comments.

Midicus MIALNEDY ZO JAN /721 

Period A-1 (First Tour & Taxis period).

Cover from Malmedy to Nancy. Dated 30 January, 1721. Manuscript "de Liege" marking. Mailed from Liege. There was no post office in Malmedy at this time. A Tour & Taxis post office for Malmedy was established in 1722. Postage was 26 sols due.

From 1704 to and including 1759, the postage rates in sols were:

The weight of a single rate letter was  $\frac{1}{4}$  oz. (loz = 1/16 lb = 28.35 gr.)

This cover was sent to Nancy via Paris at the double rate. The additional 1 sol was added when it was suspected that the cover contained an enclosure.

Between the words "Banquier" and "a Nancy" there is a handwritten mark which could be an indication of weight.

#### MALMEDY

#### by Jean Bruwier (Seraing)

(Ed. This interesting article is based on the superby display given by Jean to the Circle on 14th November, 1992)

#### A Brief History

Malmedy's origins go back to an abbey built c. 650 A.D. by St. Remacle. Gradually, over time, human settlements continued to surround it. Jointly with Stavelot, Malmedy became part of a religious principality which was run by abbots who owed their allegiance to the Bishop of Liege and the Archbishop of Cologne.

Following the defeat of the Austrians by the French at Fleurus (July 1794), the newly conquered territories (i.e. all lands west of the Rhine) became by decree part of France. This "fait accompli" was duly recognised by Austria at the Treaty of Campo Formio (1797) and was fully ratified by the Treaty of Luneville (2nd February, 1801). The principality of Stavelot thus became French and, more precisely, part of the Departement of the Ourthe (No. 96).

After the defeat of Napoleon I, the Congress of Vienna (September 1814 - June 1815) attempted to bring lasting peace in Europe, whose political map it therefore endeavoured to re-draw. Thus, the ancient religious principality was partitioned, with Malmedy going to Prussia and Stavelot to The Netherlands. Once part of Prussia, Malmedy endured for almost a century, the many upheavals characterising German political life, including the unification of the German States, the formation of the German Empire and World War I.


The Treaty of Versailles, signed on 28th July, 1919, between the Allies and Germany, finalised World War I. Malmedy became part of Belgium, which had been an independent state since 1830.

Finally, whilst World War II was in its first year (May 1940), the German Third Reich annexed Malmedy and several other localities and made them an integral part of the Third Reich. At the end of World War II, Malmedy reverted to Belgium for good.

#### Postal History: An Outline

The intricate postal history of Malmedy can be divided into four pre-philatelic (pre-adhesive stamp) and six philatelic (adhesive stamp) periods, as follows:

- A. Pre-philatelic Periods
  - A-1) First Tour & Taxis period (before 1794).
  - A-2) French period (July 1794 to March 1814).
  - A-3) Second Tour & Taxis period (March 1814 to July 1816).
  - A-4) Prussian period (1st July, 1816 to 15th November, 1850).

#### FLEMALLEX '93

As previously reported, the Phila Club Flemalle held a special exhibition to commemorate the centenary of the issue of the first Sunday-Label stamp in 1893.

A small group of our members travelled over for the event, which was held in Flemalle on 3rd/4th April, 1993. On the Saturday evening, a "twinning ceremony" took place, which is reported separately elsewhere in this issue.

"Home" members attending were Geoffrey Wood, Tony Geake, Maurice Wilkinson, Reg Harrison and Ken Carpenter. Additionally, however, we were represented by Jean Bruwier, Josef Deruyck, Michael Feron, Gaston Jorquera and Vincent Schouberechts. The last three named we were pleased to meet for the first time and to establish personal contact.

We were given a warm welcome by M. & Mme. Deneumostier, Dr. Boulet and other members of the Phila Club, and were also able to meet other noted philatelists attending.

The exhibition comprised 60 frames showing all aspects of Sunday Label issues from the 1893 Fine Barbe through to the 1912 PELLENS issue. Of special interest was a Belgian Postal Museum display showing sheets of the early values complete with marginal markings. These were duly noted by Geoffrey Wood as part of his studies. Atelier du Timbre cachet on the 1884 Issue High Values: The Balasse catalogue of 1949, part 1, states that this stamp is in black. Some years ago I found I had two copies of the 50c with traces of the A.du.T. stamp in the lower border in the colour of the stamp. Recently I noticed in Maurice Baeten's Sale catalogue, 170th Sale of 19/27 January, 1990, lot 1902 included a corner block of four of the 1 Fr. (COB 51) with the A.du.T. stamp in black. Lot 1065 in the Balasse Sale No. 1407/11 dated 13/20 March, 1993, includes a copy of the 50c with the A.du T. in colour and in the Balasse Sale No. 1343/5 dated 17/20 December, 1988, lot 102 is a block of four with the A.du.T in the colour of the stamp, the top left stamp showing variety V.I. with the prolonged T in POSTES.

I seem to remember having seen a 10 cent stamp with the A.du T. in black, that leaves the 25c, 35c and 2 Fr. stamps.



It is probable that the A. du T. for both the 2 Fr. and 35c are in the colour of the stamp, but I should like to know if anyone can throw light on the colour of the A. du T. used for both the 10c and the 25c values.

#### BRUSSELS TO LIEGE, 1919

Following the end of the war, some firms sent out printed advertising cards, franked by pre-cancelled one centime stamps (quantities of not less than 1,000). Some pre-war customers were no longer at their old address. The returned cards were marked "Parti-Vertrokken" and the stamp cancelled "REBUT".



#### BELGAPOST PRODUCTION

Members will hopefully have noticed the gradual changes (improvements) in the production and presentation of Belgapost in the last few years. In summary these are:-

- 1. Frequency of issue increased to achieve 4 per year each year should form a new volume.
- 2. Cover design new artwork and inclusion of an illustration. Aim to give each year a different coloured cover.
- 3. Inner front cover used to provide details and contact with officers of the Circle.
- Type format standardised type face and "justified" columns for all officer reports, etc.
- 5. Up-to-date reporting on all meetings, events, etc. together with results of Auction Sales when appropriate.
- 6. Inclusion of illustrations and graphics wherever possible to enhance an article.
- 7. Double sided printing to save both paper and postage costs.
- Pagination a return to continuous page numbering in each volume year.

With regard to 8. it is hoped to include with this issue an index to the contents of Volume Four and Volume Five for those members who store their issues in volume order.

The Editor would be pleased to receive articles/comments, including news on <u>your</u> activities, for future issues of Belgapost. Provided it is legible, hand-written notes are acceptable but, if in doubt, a brief call to the Editor to discuss it is well worthwhile.

Typing of notes is time consuming, especially when technical (philatelic) terms, foreign words and place names are involved. The preparation of each issue is started long before it is published. Early submission of material to the Editor is therefore urged to assist in the production and also to enable a balanced effect of each issue's contents.

#### RANDOM JOITINGS

#### by Geoffrey Wood, FRPS(L)

Another Forged Marginal Marking: Lot 157 of Balasse Sale 1220/23 of 24/ 31 October, 1981, is another example of a forged marginal mark. It is on a corner block of 4 of stamp No. 30, 1869, 10 centime, green. It is stamps 41, 42, 46, 47 of the pane. The marking reads "Serie M No. 010420" instead of "Timbres Poste Serie M No. 029574. Date" and is at the bottom of a lefthand pane instead of the top.

<u>The 1915 Issue, 35 centimes</u>: Thanks to the loan by John Connolly of a block of four of this stamp. There is a slight alteration to be made to the table on page 53 of Belgapost Volume 1. The registration mark for the half-sheet Depot 1920 should show a dot  $1\frac{1}{2}$  to 2mm to the left of the line between the 24th and 34th stamps of the sheet.

#### TREASURER'S ANNUAL REPORT AND ACCOUNTS 1992/93

Overall there has been a steady improvement in the Circle's financial position during the last year.

Membership subscriptions are, as anticipated, lower than last year (which was an abnormal year due to the recoupment of previous years' dues) and a breakdown split over the different financial years appears in the Accounts attached. The total for 1992/93 alone (£558.00) shows that this figure did not cover our basic costs and expenses (£986.15). The difference has been met by other income - from sales commission, bank interest, donations, etc. Special mention should be made of a donation on behalf of Arnold Cuigniez (£50), together with several items to be auctioned for Club funds.

This year has seen the production of 4 editions of BELGAPOST, which is reflected in the increased expenditure. Also the expected bank charges have been incurred but are more than balanced by the interest from money held on deposit account.

Although inflation has dropped, it would be prudent to assume that general costs will increase throughout next year. Additionally, there is a need to consider replacing our display frames, which will make a further demand on our resources if implemented.

On balance, I am therefore recommending that consideration be given to increasing the annual subscription from  $\pounds 8$  to  $\pounds 10$  for the year commencing 1993/94.

#### CHAIRMAN'S NOTES

#### ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

Most of the members who attended the Auction on the morning of Saturday, 24th April, 1993, remained after lunch for the Circle's Annual General Meeting.

Reports were made by the Circle's Officers - Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, Editor and Packet Secretary. Main points from reports:
